## First lady visits drug centers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nancy Reagan is venturing on a rare trip without her husband that will shift the spotlight from her free clothes and expensive china and focus it on her campaign against drug abuse.

One of Mrs. Reagan's staff aides, who asked not to be identified, said the first lady wants to draw attention to the problem of drug abuse and hopes "the publicity that results will make a lot of people across the country aware of it."

However, the aide was careful to say Mrs. Reagan is not endorsing any of the particular projects she visits.

White House aides have expressed concern that Mrs. Reagan's spending habits have received more publicity than her interest in drug abuse and foster grandparents — her two pet projects.

Mrs. Reagan planned visits to drug treatment centers today in Tampa and St. Petersburg, Fla. She is to be in Dallas Tuesday.

The journey was preceded by an unusual briefing for reporters accompanying the first lady, complete with a film about one of the drug programs she is visiting.

First ladies often travel with a partially empty aircraft, but Mrs. Reagan's government DC-9 plane was expected to be full. All the available press seats were taken because it was the first substantive trip on which reporters were invited to accompany her.

Mrs. Reagan often has expressed concern about the nation's drug problem, but has limited her active involvement to giving a few speeches and visiting a few treatment centers.

The president's wife has blamed the drug problem partially on permissive parents. Yet she also has acknowledged that she believes her two grown children "probably smoked marijuana at one time or another."

Mrs. Reagan's aides said today's trip is the first in a series as she gets more deeply involved in the anti-drug crusade.

"Mrs. Reagan is not an expert in the field of drug abuse," said one aide. "She doesn't seek to endorse, she seeks to support. She supports the concept of parents' groups and she's looking and listening and learning just like everybody else and hopes to increase ... the understanding and the concern for the problem in the hopes that the experts will find solutions."

Her first stop was the Pinellas Park Elementary School in St. Petersburg, where she was sitting in on a drug prevention program aimed at fifth graders.

In the evening, she was to attend a three-hour meeting of parents and adolescents who are going through a treatment program called Straight Inc.

She was particularly impressed with this program, an aide said, because it does not use government money, it is drug free, it is one of the few programs designed for adolescents, it accepts only children who have backing from their families and most of its participants are not from court referrals.

The program, called Straight Inc., and costs between \$1,000 and \$2,500. It uses many of the same principles as Alcoholics Anonymous.

# Trial enters third week focus is on insulin tests

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP) — The frozen vials of Martha "Sunny" von Bulow's blood have long since been destroyed, but the trail they left through medical laboratories is crucial to the state's claim that her husband tried to murder her.

Testimony in the trial of Danish-born financier Claus von Bulow, who allegedly made two attempts to kill his wife with insulin injections, entered its third week today. The handling and testing of the blood samples again were to be the focus.

Prosecutors say blood taken from Mrs. von Bulow on Dec. 21, 1980, the day she lapsed into a coma, was laden with insulin, which could have fatally aggravated her low blood-sugar condition.

But defense attorney Herald P. Fahringer argued that blood taken in the emergency room could have been confused with blood drawn later, after Mrs. von Bulow received transfusions of a sugar solution. The sugar might have caused her body to produce insulin naturally, he said.

Von Bulow's lawyers argue that his wife triggered her condition by indulging an appetite for drugs, alcohol and sweets.

Prosecutor Stephen R. Famiglietti has questioned eight witnesses to fend off defense suggestions that insulin tainting the blood samples resulted from emergency treatments at the hospital.

Medical testimony traced the

blood from Newport Hospital to the California laboratory where the insulin tests were performed. The witnesses told of standard procedures that yielded unmistakable results: insulin levels were too high to be explained naturally.

Famiglietti is trying to prove von Bulow tried to kill his heiress wife with the injections in 1979 and 1980 during Christmas visits to their Newport mansion, Clarendon Court. The prosecution claims von Bulow was motivated by greed for the \$15 million he would inherit on his wife's death and by his love for another woman.

Fahringer said in opening statements that his client, a financial consultant who once worked for the late J. Paul Getty, is a man of independent wealth who has no need for his wife's money.

The first alleged assault, on Dec. 27, 1979, dropped Mrs. von Bulow into a brief coma from which she recovered. Prosecutors say amnesia resulting from that episode prevented her from telling what had caused it.

Von Bulow's second attempt, the state contends, pushed his wife into a lasting coma on Dec. 21, 1980. She remains unconscious in a New York City hospital and is not expected to recover.

In earlier testimony, Mrs. von Bulow's devoted maid and her son by an earlier marriage told how their

suspicious gradually focused on von Bulow.

Maria Schralhammer said her doubts began after Dec. 27, 1979, when Mrs. von Bulow lapsed into her first coma. Von Bulow, she testified, delayed calling a doctor until his wife was "barely breathing."

Mrs. von Bulow recovered after a week-long hospital stay, but the German-born maid began noting the contents of a small black bag that kept turning up in the closets of the von Bulows' Newport mansion and their plush New York City apartment.
